


Liverpool City Region Wealth and Wellbeing Programme

| March 2018 | <p>Meeting with CEO of PHE, LCR political leadership, CEO Sefton Council, lead DPH for partnership working and PHE NW.</p> <p>Discussion with DsPH in the city region.</p> | <p>The prime focus of the LCR programme should be on putting population health and wellbeing at the heart of the economic and industrial strategy for the region; establishing the link between productivity and better health outcomes; engaging the LEP as a key partner.</p> <p>Support for a LCR plan that focusses on health and wealth and willingness to engage widely on this agenda.</p> <p>Development of a compelling narrative on wealth and wellbeing and the ambition and intention in LCR is key to unifying stakeholders and clarifying the complementary nature of the work to other local government policies on housing, transport, leisure and access to green spaces.</p> |
| May 2018 | Meetings with Council CEOs | <p>The range of potential activity for a LCR Wealth and Wellbeing plan crosses from developing a new economic framework case for investing in wellbeing to specific service commissioning to developing the awareness of managers in dealing with mental health issues in work, focusing on the quality of work rather than just the number of people enabled to work and developing the positive economic potential of the health care system.</p> <p>Recognition of need to fit with the existing LCR plans and with plans for wellbeing at Cheshire and Mersey level.</p>  <p>The diagram consists of three overlapping circles. Partnership with the Government Work and Health programme to be sought.</p> <p>NHS providers, particularly hospital trusts showing interest in working on social value, to be explored for potential impact on wealth and wellbeing outcomes.</p> |
| September 2018 | Update meeting with LCR Council CEO's. | <p>Agreed that the LCR Wealth and Wellbeing programme will best add value by functioning as a system connector – building bridges across the health and employment and skills agendas, linking portfolios in boroughs, translating relevant policy across the portfolios and linking to funding opportunities.</p> <p>In addition, the programme will lead the development of the system wide and local narrative on work, health and wealth that is necessary to drive large scale change. Agreed to initiate this by running a programme of events in each borough that build thematically on each</p> |

The findings of this commission were written up in a report and presented in a video. The findings were the basis for the development of a compelling narrative about work, health and the economy in LCR.</p> |
| <p>5th February 2020</p> | <p>Liverpool City Region Wealth and Wellbeing Summit. From Evidence To Action. The Mansion House, Calderstones park.</p> |  <p>“I want Liverpool City region to be the most inclusive, fair and socially just economy in the country”.</p> <p>LCR Mayor Steve Rotheram.</p> | <p>A summit workshop to bring the learning into a set of recommendations for economic planning across the city region. It included an animated video that captured the views of people who are coping with work and being ill. It made the point that the best ideas come from keeping people engaged in the implementation of economic planning and that we need to make the economy work for the health and wellbeing of all people because, in return, a healthier population will make for a more productive and inclusive economy.</p> |

| Sept 2020 | Proposal for economic renewal through a single framework of economic, social and environmental issues. | <p>The LCR Climate Partnership recommended that the LCR Combined Authority develops a strong strategic approach to economic renewal across the city region that explicitly brings together economic, social and environmental issues into a single framework.</p> <p>The Combined Authority is asked to set up a task and finish group to develop a detailed plan for application of a single framework that brings together economic, social and environmental issues to the Combined Authority for consideration and recommendation to implement.</p> <p>The proposal was discussed over several months but was ultimately unsuccessful.</p> |
| September 2021 | Integrating health and employment in Liverpool City Region | <p>Successful bid to The Health Foundation as part of the Economies for Health funding programme. This three-year project is focused on the redesign of employment services and evolution of an enhanced approach to labour market programme delivery with public health more intentionally at its core, building upon the Wealth and Wellbeing Programme's report.</p> |
| Oct. 2021 | Proposal to establish a Liverpool City Region workstream on Economies for Healthier Lives. | <p>It was proposed that a Liverpool City Region workstream is established on Economies for Healthier Lives. This would be a development from the LCR Wealth and Wellbeing Programme. The purpose of the programme would be to combine and concentrate capacity and will to create a health enhancing, inclusive and sustainable economy across LCR.</p> <p>The proposal was discussed over several months but was ultimately unsuccessful.</p> |
